Program - Fossils of New Jersey's Coastal Plain




Please join fossil expert Ned Gilmore for a presentation on the unique and interesting fossils found within New Jersey's Coastal Plain sediments. Below us are layers of ancient sediments which hold remains of prehistoric life that once lived in the region.



From the Cretaceous Period to the Pleistocene, these ages are well represented in New Jersey's fossil record. Very large marine reptiles called mosasaurs and plesiosaurs swam alongside of sharks, crocodiles and turtles in the warm Cretaceous ocean. Even before the discovery of the great Hadrosaur in Haddonfield, large bones of these animals were found Gloucester County. Besides the abundance of vertebrate animals, a fantastic diversity of invertebrates and plants have been found. Not to be outdone, the sediments of the Tertiary Period contain their own magnificent fauna and flora. Enormous sharks and land mammals inhabited the area as the ocean gave way to land. Mammoths and Mastodons roamed the changing landscape. Also special highlights will placed on the fossils and the fossil site locations within Gloucester County.

If you have a fossil, particularly one collected locally that you would like identified, you are welcome to bring it to our meeting for Ned to examine and for you to share with everyone
