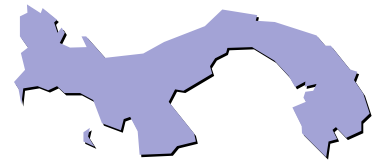
Program – Some Birds of Panama

Thursday, April 10th at 7:00 PM at EIRC, Sewell

Presenter: Jeff Holt

Panama is a country the size of South Carolina, yet with a bird population greater than all of North America, approximately 950 species. We'll take a look at some of the unique and colorful birds that inhabit this southern most Central American country. The slide show will focus on birds found in the area of the famous Canal and in the Darien, an area of impenetrable forest near Panama's border with Columbia. It is a region so remote that the Pan American Highway doesn't pass thru it.

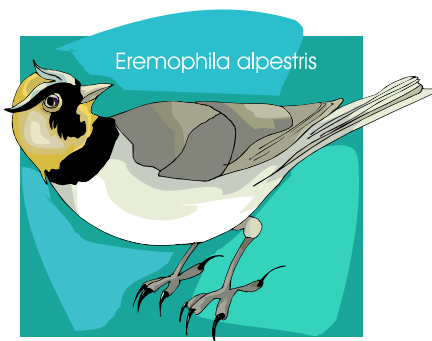


Our presenter is club member, Jeff Holt, who is a fellow of the Delaware Valley Ornithological Club and author of numerous published articles on ornithology. Jeff's program, based on his travels in Panama last year, will introduce us to the splendor and diversity of bird life in these rich and exotic Neotropical regions.

Field Trip – Salem County Birding

Saturday, April 12th, 8:45 A.M. to early afternoon

Trip Leader: Lloyd Shaw



Possibilities on this traditional early spring trip include a good variety of waterfowl, bald eagle, osprey, other raptors, pectoral sandpiper, other shorebirds, horned lark and other overwintering passerine birds, and early migrants such as palm warbler and pine warbler. The trip will visit several localities in addition to the Pedricktown Marsh, including Mannington Meadows, Featherbed Lane, and Money Island Road. This is a joint trip with the Rancocas Nature Center.

Directions: Meet at the north end of the Pedricktown Causeway (which is currently closed to though traffic). To get there, take I-295 south to Exit 10, then go west on Center Square Road for about one mile to Pedricktown Road. Turn left (south) to the causeway. Dress to suit the weather, bring binoculars (and a scope if you have one), have fuel in your car, and bring lunch and beverage. For additional information, phone the leader at (856) 986-0681.

Conservation Corner – Free Recycling Through the Mail



U.S. Postal Service Starts Service in 1,500 Post Offices

WASHINGTON, DC —Free and green. Those are the goals of a pilot program launched on March 17th by the U.S. Postal Service that allows customers to *recycle small electronics and inkjet cartridges* by mailing them free of charge.

The “Mail Back” program helps consumers make more environmentally friendly choices, making it easier for customers to discard used or obsolete small electronics in an environmentally responsible way. Customers use free envelopes found in 1,500 Post Offices to mail back inkjet cartridges, PDAs, Blackberries, digital cameras, iPods and MP3 players – without having to pay for postage.

Postage is paid for by Clover Technologies Group, a nationally recognized company that recycles, remanufactures and remarkets inkjet cartridges, laser cartridges and small electronics. If the electronic item or cartridges cannot be refurbished and resold, its component parts are reused to refurbish other items, or the parts are broken down further and the materials are recycled. Clover Technologies Group has a “zero waste to landfill” policy: it does everything it can to avoid contributing any materials to the nation’s landfills.

It was this philosophy that won Clover the contract with the Postal Service, besting 19 other companies, said Anita Bizzotto, chief marketing officer and executive vice president for the Postal Service.

“As one of the nation’s leading corporate citizens, the Postal Service is committed to environmental stewardship,” Bizzotto said. “This program is one more way the Postal Service is empowering consumers to go green.”

The free, postage-paid Mail Back envelopes can be found on displays in Post Office lobbies. There is no limit to the number of envelopes customers may take.

The pilot is set for 10 areas across the country, including Washington, D.C., Chicago, Los Angeles and San Diego, but could become a national program this fall if the pilot program proves successful.

“We know our customers are interested in real solutions for proper disposal of personal electronics,” Bizzotto said. “Everyone from consumers to businesses to non-profit organizations use the mail, and the Postal Service works to manage resources wisely to minimize environmental impact.”

Red Knot Update - Horseshoe Crab Harvest Banned Indefinitely!

Horseshoe crabbing has been banned indefinitely in New Jersey thanks to a new law signed by Governor Jon S. Corzine on Tuesday, March 25. As mentioned in last month’s newsletter, the Red Knot, a migratory shorebird whose numbers are declining, feeds on the crabs' eggs as it passes through the Delaware Bay while migrating between South America and the Arctic.

"We all have to recognize that one action begets another action, and in the last few years I think we all come to realize how fragile our Earth is and it needs to be protected," Corzine said before signing the ban into law.

This is a large victory for environmentalists, and all of us who made sure our opinion was made known to our legislators should feel a sense of pride in this success.

Kid's Corner - Milk Carton Viewer* by Deb Maka
(It will help you answer the question: What lives in a puddle?)

What You Need:

- Milk or beverage container, any size
- Plastic wrap
- Strong rubber bands, big enough to go around your container
- Scissors to cut the container

Directions:

1. Cut off the bottom of the container (milk or juice carton, plastic milk jug, etc.)
2. Cut a piece of heavy plastic wrap big enough to cover the opening at the bottom of the container and about half way up the sides of the container
3. Use rubber bands to hold the plastic wrap in place
4. Open up the top of the container so you can look through the top and out the bottom

After you've made your viewer, go to your favorite pond, stream, or puddle and stick your viewer part-way into the water (with the plastic wrap side in the water). Look inside and you'll see inside the water. What can you find living in a puddle?

The 2008 Gloucester County Bird Quest: Saturday May 3, 2008

The Gloucester County Nature Club and its co-sponsors invite people of all ages to participate in the **2008 (ninth annual) Gloucester County Bird Quest. The 2008 Bird Quest** will take place on **Sat., May 3, 2008 from 7 AM to 12 noon throughout Gloucester County.**

During this time, teams visit parks and natural sites in Gloucester County to find as many different bird species as they can. The Quest is:

- A way to discover Gloucester County's parks and natural areas
- A way to discover the unique birds that live in and through our county
- An opportunity to learn how to identify birds by sight, sound, behavior, and habitat
- An opportunity to have fun with family, friends, and colleagues
- A light-hearted competition



The Quest is an educational event: novices are encouraged to participate. At noon, all participants gather at Atkinson County Park on Delsea Drive to report results and for **(free) lunch, t-shirts, and prizes.**

We encourage you to organize your own Quest team with colleagues, friends, and/or family. Last year's Gloucester County Bird Quest attracted several hundred participants made up of families, friends, teachers, school groups, scout troops, environmental commissions ... residents of Gloucester and neighboring counties. **If you have participated in the past why not invite a friend or colleagues to join you for this year's Bird Quest!** With support from Wheelabrator, LP of Gloucester County, the club will again operate two (free) guided buses for individuals unable to form their own team and who are willing to join a larger group. Our theme this year is "Natural Places of Gloucester County" and will be featured in a T-shirt designed by the club's own Gary Lizzi. A county map and other materials are provided to registered teams. **A \$12 fee per participant helps to defray the cost of lunch, T-shirts, prizes etc.**

Birding Basics

Alcyon Lake, Pitman Learn the basics of good birding and the tools of the trade.

Directions: From Rt 55 Exit 53A (or Exit 53 if coming from the south) take Rt 553 (Glassboro Road) south for about 1.5 miles to Holly Avenue. Turn right (west) on Holly Avenue. Continue for 1.2 miles to the park entrance, which is on the left. There is a small sign. Drive past the sports fields; meet at the pavilion.

WANTED: Information about Gloucester County Big Trees

There will be photos of leaves, fruit, bark, and overall aspect. Between 35 and 40 species will be covered.

Natural Events for the month of April

- Pond turtles emerge from hibernation and bask in the sun.
- Spring beauty, bloodroot, and trout lily bloom on the floor of deciduous woodlands.
- Spring peepers and wood frogs begin calling when vernal ponds warm to about 50 degrees F.
- Shad migrate up the Delaware River to spawn.
- Ruby-throated hummingbirds, purple martins, and warblers begin to arrive.
- Most juncos and white-throated sparrows have left by the end of the month.
- Rose-breasted grosbeaks show up at feeders for a few days before heading north.
- Prairie warbler, misnamed when it was first found in a barren area in Kentucky, returns late April – mid May.
- The peak of spring raptor migration is mid-to-late April. Consider a visit to a hawk lookout.
- Red-winged blackbirds return to marshes.
